Jean Paul (born as Johann Paul Friedrich Richter, 21 March 1763 – 14 November 1825) was a German Romantic writer, best known for his humorous novels and stories. Jean Paul began his career as a man of letters with *Grönländische Prozesse* ("Greenland Lawsuits"), published anonymously in Berlin in 1783-84, and *Auswahl aus des Teufels Papieren* ("Selections from the Devil's Papers", signed J. P. F. Hasus), published in 1789. In 1801 he married Caroline Meyer, whom he had met in Berlin the year before. They lived first at Meiningen, then at Coburg; and finally, in 1804, they settled at Bayreuth. Here Richter spent a quiet, simple, and happy life, constantly occupied with his work as a writer. In September 1821 Jean Paul lost his only son, Max, a youth of the highest promise; and he never quite recovered from this shock. He lost his sight in 1824, and died of dropsy at Bayreuth, on 14 November 1825.
